Part A: Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Closing the attainment gap between disadvantaged children and their peers is our greatest challenge at Mossgate Primary School. The gap is entrenched and complex, and most lie beyond our school. However, it is clear that we can make a difference based on evidence. Great teaching and careful planning can make a huge impact on the outcomes of disadvantaged children.

Our evidenced-informed approach to Pupil Premium spending has helped us to:

- Compare how similar challenges have been tackled in other schools
- Understand the strength of evidence behind alternative approaches
- Consider the likely cost-effectiveness of a range of approaches

We use the EEF's tiered approach which focuses on high quality teaching, targeted academic support and wider strategies.

1. High quality teaching

Spending on developing high quality teaching includes investment in professional development, training and support for teachers new to the profession. Ensuring that an effective teacher is in front of every class, and that every teacher is supported to keep improving, is the key ingredient to of a successful school and should rightly be a top priority for pupil premium spending.

2. Targeted academic support

Evidence consistently shows the positive impact that targeted academic support can have, including on those who are not making good progress, or those who have been disproportionately impacted by the effects of the pandemic.

3. Wider strategies

Wider strategies relate to the most significant non-academic challenges to success in school, which may also negatively impact upon academic attainment, including:

- attendance and levels of persistent absence
- behaviour incidences and exclusions
- social and emotional support, including mental health, and safeguarding concerns

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our disadvantaged pupils.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	Disadvantaged pupils have multiple barriers to learning including SEND (14 pupils), behaviour, support from external agencies (??) and historical attendance (7 persistent absentees and 17 pupils <96%) and punctuality concerns (15 pupils).
2	Underdeveloped oral language skills, vocabulary gaps and difficulties with phonics and early reading skills negatively impacts on some disadvantaged pupils' ability to access the curriculum fully.
3	Levels of parental engagement, support with learning at home and access to clubs and visits are lower for disadvantaged pupils.
4	Disadvantaged pupils are less likely to use metacognitive and self-regulatory strategies without being explicitly taught these.

Intended outcomes

Outcomes for disadvantaged pupils

End of year attainment data compared to National 2022 where available.

KS2 11/30 children disadvantaged

- 73% E+ in Reading, Writing and Maths combined compared to 43% nationally
- 91% E+ in Reading compared to 62% nationally
- 73% E+ in Writing compared to 55% nationally
- 91% E+ in Maths compared to 56% nationally

KS1 14/30 children disadvantaged

- 57% E+ in Reading, Writing and Maths combined – no national data
- 57% E+ in Reading compared to 51% nationally
- 57% E+ in Writing compared to 41% nationally
- 64% in Maths compared to 52% nationally

Y1 Phonics Screening Check 11/30 children disadvantaged

- 100% of disadvantaged children (11/30 children) passed

EYFS 6/30 children disadvantaged

- 33% (2/6 children) achieved Good Level of Development compared to 49% nationally

Attendance

- 59% of Pupil Premium children (85 in total) had attendance of 96+%.
- 89.5% of Pupil Premium children (50/85) with attendance above 90%.
- 10.5% of Pupil Premium children (9/85) classed as persistently absent.
